





A New Chapter for CatholicCare Wollongong

March 2025 marked a transformative moment for CatholicCare as we transitioned from our long-standing premises on Auburn Street to our new home at 6-8 Regent Street, right in the heart of Wollongong. This move reflects our commitment to fostering a modern, collaborative environment – one that supports innovation, care and the evolving needs of our staff and the communities we serve.

Our new office features an open-plan design that encourages teamwork and collaboration. Dedicated meeting spaces and wellness areas to provide opportunities for staff and clients to connect, reflect, recharge and engage meaningfully. The central location strengthens our ties with the wider Wollongong community, making it easier for us to collaborate and extend our support where it is needed most.

This relocation is part of a broader vision

within the Diocese, with Auburn Street set to become a future Diocesan Hub. For CatholicCare, the move is a testament to our adaptability and forward thinking approach – ensuring we have the right environment to deliver services and grow alongside our community's needs.

In May, we celebrated this new beginning with a blessing ceremony attended by Bishop Brian Mascord, staff, and community leaders. The event captured the spirit of our new space: a place of belonging and collaboration for our team, and a place of welcome, possibility, and healing for the people we support.

While the address has changed, our mission remains steadfast: to provide care, connection, and hope to everyone who walks through our doors. We invite you to visit our new office, connect with our team and join us as we embark on this new chapter.

Showcasing Innovation on a Global Stage: SSFP at the International Conference

CatholicCare's School Student & Family Program (SSFP) is engaged by Catholic Education to provide psycho-social support in systemic catholic schools in the Diocese of Wollongong.

In November 2024, SSFP proudly represented CatholicCare at the 10th International Conference on Social Work in Health & Mental Health, held in Melbourne. This prestigious event brought together more than 1,000 delegates from Australia and around the world, providing a unique opportunity for CatholicCare to share its expertise and commitment to improving outcomes for children and families.

At the conference, the SSFP team presented the impact of the Kindy Kids Connect program, an early intervention school counselling initiative designed to support children as they transitioned to kindergarten. The program takes a wrap-around approach, engaging children, parents, and educators to build resilience, foster social-emotional skills, and create a strong sense of belonging during this critical developmental stage.

Kindy Kids Connect uses evidence-based strategies to build resilience, foster social-emotional skills and create a strong sense of belonging.

Through classroom-based sessions and resources for parents and teachers, the program equips children with coping skills and confidence, while strengthening partnerships between families and schools.

Presenting at this global conference was more than an academic exercise; it was a chance to demonstrate CatholicCare's leadership in school-based mental health and wellbeing. The conference also highlighted our commitment to knowledge-sharing and collaboration. By engaging with international peers, SSFP contributed to a broader conversation about how social work empowers communities and transform lives.

Looking ahead, the program continues to expand to more schools, ensuring that even more children benefit from early intervention strategies that promoted resilience and wellbeing.

This achievement reflects CatholicCare's vision for inclusive, thriving communities where every child feels safe, supported, and ready to learn.

By sharing our approach on a global platform, we reaffirm our commitment to innovation, excellence and collaboration in service delivery.

We believe in creating opportunities. Possibility is about innovation, adaptability, and finding new ways to accompany individuals and families in discovering new ways to thrive, even in challenging times.

Our strategy comes to life through four strategic pillars, each with specific actions and measurable targets:

1. Our People, Mission and Culture

Investing in our workforce and nurturing a culture that reflects our mission. This means supporting professional development, wellbeing, and creating an environment where staff feel valued and connected.

2. Service Excellence

Delivering high-quality, evidence-based services that meet the diverse needs of our communities. We aim to continually improve how we work, ensuring consistency and impact.

3. Service Growth

Expanding programs and partnerships to reach more people. Growth is not just about size—it's about responding to emerging needs and being present where we are most needed.

4. Sustainability and Stewardship

Building strong foundations for the future through sound financial management, efficient systems, and innovative practices that ensure long-term viability.

This strategy was shaped by extensive consultation with staff, clients and community partners.

Progress will be tracked through a balanced scorecard, covering client outcomes, staff engagement, financial health, and innovation. Key metrics and targets will be published annually, ensuring transparency and accountability.

We recognise the complexity and uncertainty of today's world, including funding pressures, workforce shortages, and evolving community needs. Our strategy is designed to address these challenges by remaining agile, investing in our people, and embracing innovation.

Purpose. Passion. Possibility. sets the tone for how CatholicCare will meet future challenges: by staying true to our mission, energising our people, and embracing innovation. The work we do today shapes the opportunities of tomorrow, and with this strategy as our guide, we are ready to create lasting impact for individuals, families, and communities across the Diocese of Wollongong.

Cross+Gen: Bridging Generations and Winning National Recognition

In February 2025, CatholicCare's Cross+Gen program celebrated a major milestone, earning the Award for Innovation and Contribution at the Australian Institute for Intergenerational Practice's Annual Conference. This national recognition highlights its success in strengthening intergenerational connections.

Launched in 2021 with Catholic Education Diocese of Wollongong, Cross+Gen pairs high school students with older community members to bridge the digital divide. Now active in four schools and 15 parishes, the program turns technology into a tool for connection. Students teach digital skills while seniors share life experience—building empathy, confidence, and leadership.

The impact goes beyond skills. Participants describe “the hum” of conversation and laughter that fills each session, reflecting belonging and mutual respect. In the past year, 110 older participants and 80 students engaged in the program. Students valued teaching and bonding, while seniors rated it highly, averaging 4.5/5 for helpfulness.



Cross+Gen shows every generation has something to offer. It promotes independence for older adults and purpose for youth, strengthening families and communities. Winning this award affirms CatholicCare's commitment to inclusion and innovation. Sessions rotate each school term across the Diocese—check our Events page for upcoming dates.




Revenue

Key Snapshots

Overall revenue declined by **\$1.82 million (5.3%)**, driven by decreases in **Family Services (-10.7%)** and **Disability Services (-18.5%)**. However, **OSHC revenue grew by 13.4% (\$756,749)**, reflecting strong demand for out of school hours care and vacation care.

We achieved a **net surplus of \$759,761**, ensuring financial stability despite economic challenges. This represents a **28% decrease** compared to FY2024, primarily due to reduced government funding and rising operational costs.

Total staff decreased from **380 to 337**, yet **full-time roles increased by 4%**, showing commitment to a stable workforce. Salary expenses dropped by **\$716,936 (-3.4%)**, aligning with efficiency measures while maintaining service quality.
